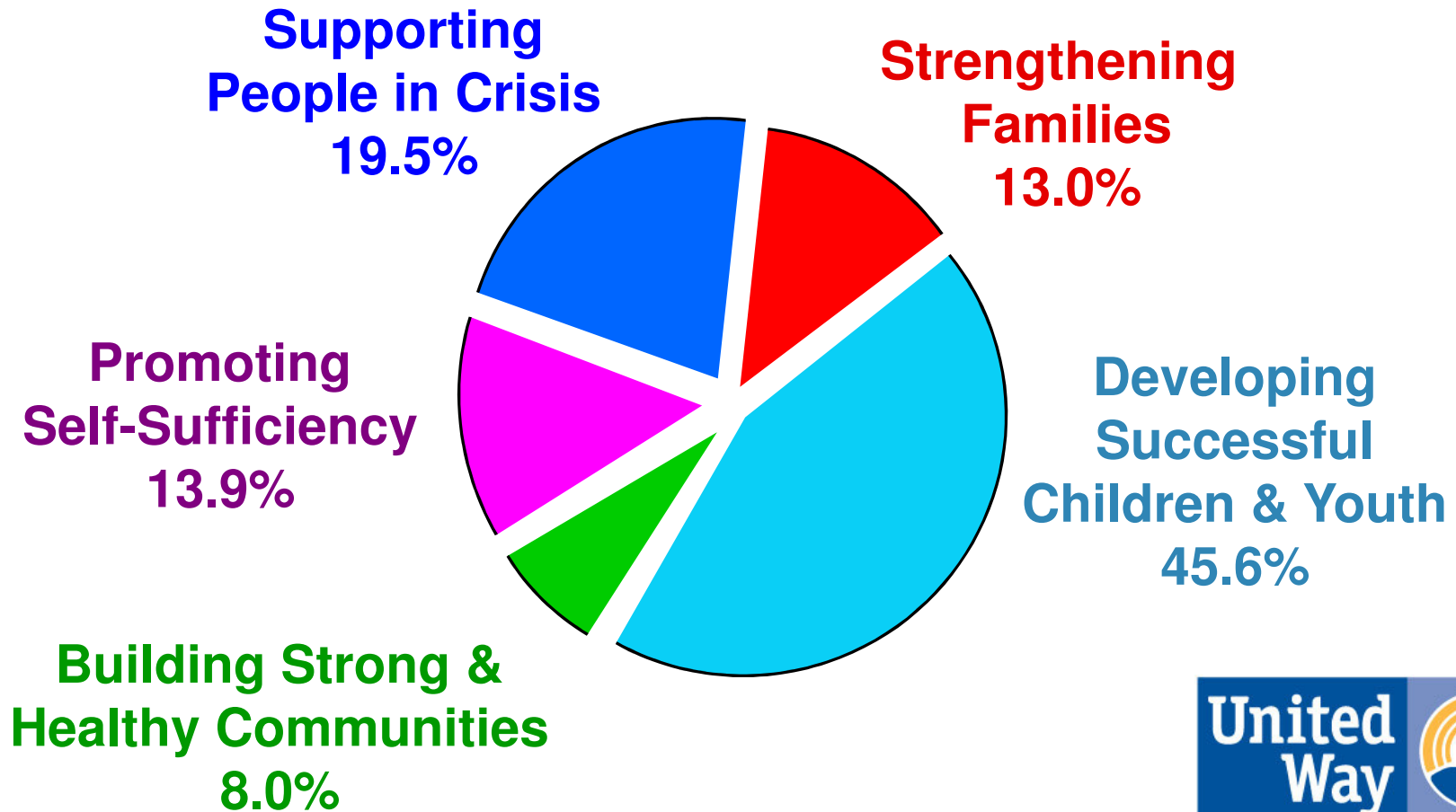

IMPACT AREAS

SUPPORTING PEOPLE IN CRISIS: 6 programs that provide food, shelter, resource needs and support to people during a crisis or disaster

STRENGTHENING FAMILIES: 6 programs that provide families information, support, and counseling

DEVELOPING SUCCESSFUL CHILDREN & YOUTH: 11 programs that build developmental assets & provide services to children & youth

BUILDING STRONG & HEALTHY COMMUNITIES: 5 programs to promote good health & volunteerism

PROMOTING SELF-SUFFICIENCY: 7 programs that enable all people to be as self-sufficient as possible and participate in the community



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SUPPORTING PEOPLE IN CRISIS

Because of funds raised in last year's campaign, this year in Washington County:

- ❖ Over 2,000 nights of shelter will be provided by Friends of Abused Families to women and children experiencing domestic violence
- ❖ 600 victims of fires, tornados and other disasters will have their immediate food, shelter, clothing and medical needs met because of Red Cross' Disaster Services Program
- ❖ 1,200 low income families and individuals will receive 50 pounds per person of canned and packaged food, bakery goods, meats, commodities, fresh fruits and vegetables when they go to the Full Shelf Food Pantry
- ❖ Over 1,500 elderly and disabled residents can live more safely at home because first responders will be able find emergency medical information provided through the Red Cross' File for Life Program



STRENGTHENING FAMILIES

Because of funds raised in last year's campaign, this year in Washington County:

- ❖ 150 adult caretakers, including parents who are in jail, will incorporate positive parenting skills that they learned by attending weekly Parents Anonymous support group sessions offered by the Youth & Family Project
- ❖ Over 80 concerned family members will increase their knowledge on how their behaviors contribute to their family problems because of the Intervention Program of the Council on Alcohol & Other Drug Abuse
- ❖ 130 parents and caregivers will learn positive parenting techniques by attending a Family Center workshop
- ❖ Almost 150 families will be able to take a periodic break from the day-to-day care of a person with disabilities because of Threshold's Respite Program



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DEVELOPING SUCCESSFUL CHILDREN & YOUTH

Because of funds raised in last year's campaign, this year in Washington County:

- ❖ 200 at-risk children will be matched to an adult mentor through the Big Brothers Big Sisters Match Program
- ❖ 4,000 youth will be able to participate in alcohol, tobacco and drug free events organized by the Prevention Program of the Council on Alcohol & Other Drug Abuse
- ❖ 60% of the 352 Project Learn participants at the Boys & Girls Club will improve their letter grade in school by at least 1.
- ❖ 50 juvenile offenders will learn how their negative behavior affects both their victim and the community by participating in Nova Services Juvenile Accountability Program
- ❖ Over 1,000 Boy Scouts will learn teamwork, self-confidence and positive values as they advance at least one rank from Tiger Cub to Eagle Scout



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BUILDING STRONG & HEALTHY COMMUNITIES

Because of funds raised in last year's campaign, this year in Washington County:

- ❖ 1,300 Hartford area residents will have an opportunity to donate blood locally through blood drives sponsored by the Hartford Blood Donor's Club at the VFW and Hartford Union High School
- ❖ Over 700 individuals and families will be able to connect with volunteer opportunities that meet their needs and interests, saving programs thousands of dollars, because of the Volunteer Center's Volunteer Connections Program
- ❖ 100 new mentors will feel more prepared and confident in their role as a mentor after completing Big Brothers Big Sisters Volunteer Training
- ❖ Almost 2,000 people will become prepared to respond to an emergency after attending Red Cross' Health & Safety Educational Programs



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PROMOTING SELF-SUFFICIENCY

Because of funds raised in last year's campaign, this year in Washington County:

- ❖ 50 individuals with disabilities will have at least one person other than a family member or caregiver that is willing to be their friend and speak on their behalf because of the Citizen Advocacy Program
- ❖ Almost 100 lonely senior citizens will enhance their lifestyle and make new friends by participating in activities and programs offered by Senior Citizens Activities
- ❖ 60 homeless young adults, ages 18 to 21 years old, will accept referrals to community resources provided to them by the Youth & Family Project
- ❖ 24 individuals with disabilities will improve their self-confidence and social skills by participating in creative art classes offered by Donna Lexa Community Art Center



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
